- 8:30–11:00AM Pre-Conference Workshop—“Learning Space: Your Place or Mine?”**
Join Susan M. Rundle, President of Performance Concepts International, for a discussion that explores the complex relationship between student learning styles, the physical environment, and academic achievement. A student can be placed in any learning environment and learn basic information. However, when one identifies the biological factors that hinder or stimulate learning, a broader understanding of how to utilize existing space becomes copiously clear. Learning styles are a combination of many biological and experientially imposed characteristics that contribute to the way students begin to concentrate on, process, absorb, and retain new and difficult academic information. Because the interaction of these elements occurs differently in everyone, it is important to determine how to respond to students’ natural processing styles to produce long-term memory and retention. This session explores those factors that can easily be addressed in existing school structures. We also identify how students’ learning spaces differ and affect students’ achievement. Research shows that achievement can be increased in six weeks by matching the lighting needs of a student. Other factors in the physical environment that easily can affect academic achievement are addressed.

- 1:30–3:00PM Keynote Address—“From Green to RED Design: The Theory and Practice of Restorative Environmental Design”** Dr. Stephen R. Kellert, Tweedy Ordway Professor of Social Ecology at Yale University’s School of Forestry and Environmental Studies, delivers a keynote presentation that suggests that true and lasting sustainability in the built environment (restorative environmental design) requires both a low environmental impact design approach that avoids and mitigates adverse impacts on natural systems, as well as a positive environmental impact or biophilic design strategy that enhances human health and well-being by fostering inherent human affinities for nature. Unfortunately, the prevailing paradigm of design of the human built environment accomplishes neither objective, while current sustainable design strategies focus almost exclusively on low environmental design approaches. The benefits and means for achieving a more effective restorative environmental design approach is described and tied to human evolution and biology.

- 1. “Working Together for Success: Parents, Students, and Schools”**
Schools and communities can create a promise for the future through recognizing and valuing the inherent worth and uniqueness of each individual. When schools, parents, and children work together utilizing a common language, motivation for life-long learning will be sustained. When one child succeeds, everyone triumphs. - 1. “Why Not?” A Discussion of Educational Facilities Within the Context of a Changing 21st Century America**
When preparing for a new school building or renovation, we often ask “what” and sometimes “how” and “why,” but it is rare in these days of fast-track schedules and inflation-fearful budgets to ask “what if” or “why not?” This session challenges conventional wisdom and provides fuel for creative facility design.

- 1. The Community Design Process**
This seminar uses the District of Columbia community engagement process as a case study for community engagement and consensus building. Participants engage in an interactive question and answer exercise demonstrating how “real time” group participation can move expectations and influence opinion.
 - 2. Performance Contracting: Investing and Payback**
This seminar offers a case study with lessons learned, do’s and don’ts, and provides helpful examples of what to look for if your school district might be considering performance contracting. The basics of performance contracting, including the selection of a Performance Contractor, the identification of energy saving measures, the proposal review, and the delivery of the savings are discussed.

Classroom amplification is not just about hearing; it is about providing a more ideal learning environment for every student—essentially “activating” students in the learning process. This session includes a case study of a school system that implemented use of active learning systems. - 1. Planning, Designing, and Constructing Educational Facilities Today—“What a Pain!”**
Architects and engineers currently produce construction documents under the premise of “reasonably inferable and general intent” while contractors and subcontractors bid and construct under a “plan and specification takeoff.” This session addresses the impact of the gap created between these two positions in planning, budgeting, designing, bidding, and constructing educational facilities today.
 - 2. Selecting Quality School Sites**
This mini session offers an overview of how potential school sites are typically identified and reviews the most common search criteria for school sites. Multiple examples of site evaluations are discussed, including the process used by Chesapeake Public Schools to acquire school sites.

Public and private schools across the commonwealth have undertaken major renovation projects whose costs were significantly reduced through the successful application for historic tax credits. 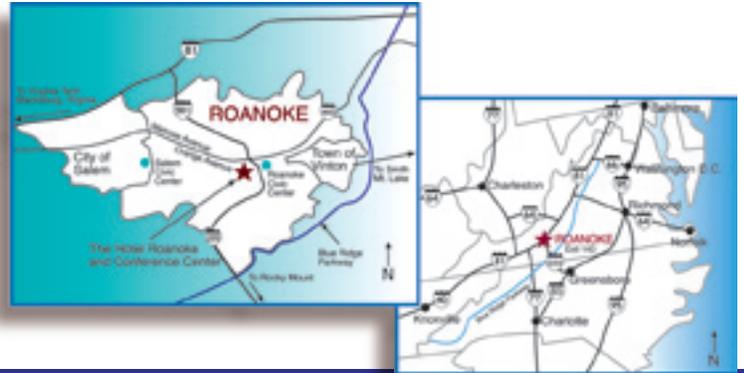
