SUBJECT: ALERT – Career and Technical Education (CTE) Maximum Class Size

As you prepare to submit the 2014 fall Master Schedule Collection (MSC) data, please be advised to work closely with school counselors and other personnel who are responsible for scheduling students for CTE classes. All schools and regional technical centers must comply with the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and state [Regulations Governing Career and Technical Education, 8VAC20-120-150](#) (maximum class size) and [8VAC20-120-170](#) (student safety).

The Virginia Department of Labor and Industry (VDOLI) has worked with the Office of Career and Technical Education to identify CTE classes impacted by federal OSHA regulations. The [current list](#) of CTE courses that have a maximum class size relating to safety standards and target populations must be maintained during fiscal years 2014 and 2015. Adherence to these maximum class sizes is critical. VDOLI is responsible for enforcing child endangerment laws, which cover CTE laboratory settings in public schools, and can involve criminal penalties for non-compliance.

[Superintendent's Memorandum #171-14](#) outlines information in response to temporary flexibility language related to the Standards of Quality (SOQ) from the 2014 Appropriation Act (Section Two, Non Standards – Miscellaneous Reporting). However, this waiver does not apply to the class size maximum of CTE courses where safety is an issue pursuant to OSHA requirements or courses serving certain target populations (disabled and disadvantaged students). Refer to [Superintendent's Memorandum #181-14](#) for more detailed information.

Additionally, it is important to note that the procurement and use of equipment for middle school courses in Agricultural Education, Family and Consumer Sciences, and Technology Education must be provided for instructional applications that do not require use of commercial industrial equipment. Any use of commercial industrial equipment in a middle school laboratory is for teacher demonstration purposes only. School divisions must take appropriate safeguards to ensure students satisfy all safety requirements before using any type of appropriate equipment and that only teachers have access to commercial industrial equipment.
