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State Superintendent Grants SOL Flexibility for 54 Schools *High Performance Earns Full Accreditation for Three Years*

Superintendent of Public Instruction Patricia I. Wright today awarded waivers from annual accreditation to 54 high-performing schools. Each school receiving a waiver will remain fully accredited for three years. The schools qualified for the flexibility by achieving pass rates of 95 percent or higher in all four tested Standards of Learning (SOL) content areas for two consecutive years.

“The waivers provide an opportunity for high-achieving schools to try new approaches in covering the SOL content without worrying about a potential short-term impact on test scores and accreditation ratings,” Wright said. “I encourage superintendents and principals to empower teachers in these schools to move away from excessive review and practice and focus instead on providing rich and varied instruction that exceeds the standards.”

The following schools qualified for the waivers by achieving SOL pass rates in English, mathematics, history/social science and science of 95 percent or greater during the 2008-2009 and 2009-2010 school years.

The Board of Education in 2006 authorized waivers from annual accreditation for high-performing schools. Under the provision, schools receiving waivers continue to administer SOL tests and results are reported to parents and the public.

Last month, Wright reminded the superintendents of the school divisions with qualifying schools of the provision in the accountability regulations and invited them to apply for waivers.

“During recent months, several superintendents have complained to the state board that — because of annual accreditation — they are requiring even high-achieving students to spend too much time focused on preparing for the tests,” Wright said. “While I reject the idea that accountability is a barrier to rich, in-depth instruction for all students, I wanted to remind school divisions of the flexibility that already exists in the accreditation standards for innovation and advanced teaching and learning.”

The divisions that accepted Wright’s invitation are the first to apply under the five-year-old waiver provision. All of the invited divisions except Albemarle County, Arlington County, Fairfax County, Harrisonburg, Henrico County and Virginia Beach applied for the waivers.

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
