### Reference Sources Path

#### Supplies Needed:

- One gameboard per pair.
- One six-sided die.
- Two game pieces, one for each player.
- “Which source is best?” cards

#### Directions:

Player 1 chooses a card and reads it aloud. Player 1 must decide which reference source should be used in the scenario. He then moves to the next space on the board with that reference source listed. Player 2 checks for correctness.

Player 2 repeats the same procedure.

The game is over when one player reaches one of the final three boxes.
